If you took an advanced extrication class for 20 hours from another company it would cost you approximately \$500. If you took it from TARS it would cost \$85.

Over the last few years we as state officers have encouraged you to keep the history of your individual units alive; to teach your new upcoming members where you came from. Then it occurred to me: how many of us, me included aren't aware of the details of how TARS came to be. So I decided it was time for a TARS history lesson.

Year one of your association.....

January 13, 1955 at 7:40pm EST at Johnson City Crew Headquarters J.W. Abbott opened the organizational meeting and turned it over to Temporary Chairperson Hubert Phillips and a nameless association was born. A group of men from four different units: Elizabethton, Kingsport, Johnson City and Greeneville, came together with one mission. That mission as stated by C.M. Kenner of Kingsport was "the main objective of this association would be the spreading of the First Aid Gospel throughout the state of Tennessee." The group determined that there was a need for officers and a board of directors, it was decided that these should consist of a president, two vice presidents, secretary, treasurer and one person from each member unit. The first group of elected officers was: C.M. Kenner- President, J.W. Abbott- First Vice President, Earl Schramlin- Second Vice President, Paul Metcalf- Secretary, Charles Engel- Treasurer. At this point the meeting was turned over to the first president of the organization.

The next points of business; Julian S. Wise of the Virginia Association of Volunteer Rescue Squads was instrumental in building our organization not only by sharing his knowledge but by donating the first dollar to the association in order that a treasury could be started. Dues for membership were determined based upon what had to be paid to the International Association. Each unit had to pay \$32.58. Next was the name; the group agreed on Tennessee Association of Rescue Squads (TARS). The president then appointed a bylaws committee and the next meeting date was determined, and the group moved to invite Morristown to join the association.

The rest of the year went by quickly as all of these things were addressed: Hubert Phillips and his committee drafted the Constitution and Bylaws mirroring them after the Virginia Association and the International Association's and they were adopted by TARS. Bill fold size membership cards and letter head were designed and ordered. Earl Schramlin and his committee succeeded in getting legislation introduced to authorize the issuance of free license plates to all squad owned mobile units.

The secretary was appointed as historian until one could be elected. Jellico Squad was asked to join TARS. The round emblem with the cross and dove was designed by S.S. Jones and Johnson City and adopted by TARS. A membership committee was appointed and charged with the endeavor of strengthening membership and a membership application was drafted and adopted. By the end of the year attendance at the meetings consisted of persons from Elizabethton, Greeneville, Johnson City, Kingsport, Jellico, Rockwood, and Oak Ridge.

I hope that you have enjoyed your history lesson and now it is time for a pop quiz. What is the greatest organization that has ever been established?

It's only May and we are already having temperatures near 90 degrees. As we head into summer there are dangers that come with the climbing temperatures. Rescue personnel are at a much higher risk during hot weather. The risk can increase due to wearing turnout gear during vehicle extrication and due to prolonged sun exposure during water related recoveries. The dangers of heat exhaustion and heat stroke increase dramatically. It's important for everyone to know the difference between exhaustion and stroke, to recognize the signs and symptoms of each and know a few precautions.

Signs of heat exhaustion are heavy sweating, cool, moist, pale or flushed skin, headache, dizziness or weakness and nausea. These symptoms may lead to heat stroke.

Signs of heat stroke are high body temperature, flushed hot dry skin with NO sweating, vomiting, weak rapid pulse, change in consciousness, confusion and shallow breathing. These symptoms can be life threatening. Seek immediate medical attention and watch the person closely.

Precautions can be taken to avoid heat intolerance.

- Drink water in frequent, small amounts. Don't wait until you feel thirsty to drink water. Don't drink alcohol, caffeine or sugary drinks. Don't take salt tablets.
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothes and a hat. Wear sun screen with at least an SPF of 15.
- Stay in a cool place during the hottest hours of the day, from about 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Don't leave children, pets or senior citizens unattended in a car for even a few minutes.
