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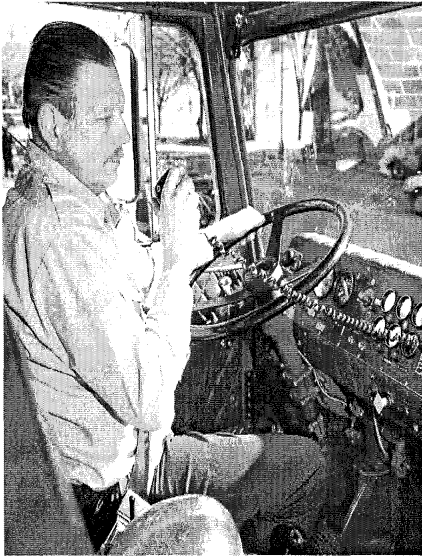
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State Chaplain—Charles Gabel

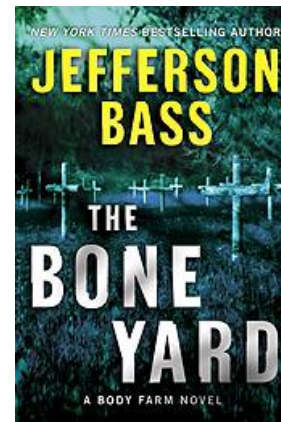

What Does A Bad Horror Movie and the Lack of Financial Oversight Have in Common?

They both usually have a bad ending. In recent years I have investigated a rescue squad treasurer who when paying the squads utility and telephone bills, added the same charges for his residence and paid them both with the squads check. He even got brave enough to write checks payable to himself. When confronted with the accidental discovery of his deeds he had “borrowed” about \$25,000 from the rescue squad’s bank account. Another involved a church treasurer who started “skimming” money from the Sunday offering plate and grew to payment of his utility and telephone service, property taxes and his home mortgage for over two years with checks drawn on the Church’s account. He “borrowed” over \$70,000 before his bad deeds were discovered.

Another involved a local volunteer fire department treasurer who used the departments ATM card to withdraw over \$12,000 in cash for personal expenses before someone noticed that there was not as much money in the bank as they thought they should have. Another involved a treasurer of a local parent –teachers’ organization who borrowed over \$300,000 from their bank account. When this was discovered and the news was reported on the front page of the local newspaper, several other area not-for-profit organizations ask the question, “Could this happen to us”?, unfortunately for some when they investigated the possibility the answer was not only yes, it could, but, yes it had.

Others included the sponsor of a cheer leading group who spent their funds for a personal vacation; a member who used the organizations credit card to pay personal expenses, and the list goes on.

What do these organizations have in common, they all lacked financial oversight. Most treasurers of small not-for-profit organizations are honest, ethical and dependable. They perform the duties of their office with integrity and should be thanked for their hard work. However, some seize the opportunity to “borrow” from the treasures of the organization. I say borrow because this is generally the response given when they are confronted with their actions. “I did not steal the money, I only borrowed it, and I planned to pay it back.” While this may have been their original intentions, few ever pay it back. They have already spent the money and often lack the ability to return the stolen funds.

Another common theme is these organizations had little if any controls over the handling of their finances. No one ever looked at the check book, no treasurers reports were given, the treasurer had full control over receiving and spending of money, depositing of funds, writing and signing of checks, approval of invoices, authority to make purchases, preparation of bank reconciliations, opening of mail etc. No one other than the treasurer performed these tasks or did any review of these activities. Does this describe your organization? Could you be a victim? If so, here are some steps you should take to protect yourself from “unauthorized borrowing” of your hard earned funds. Consider for example...

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WATARS President—Sandy Laughlin

What can a Crewette auxiliary do for us? Why do we need them? What do they even do? These are questions we are asked by Squads that don't have Crewettes. Perhaps you have thought this when you hear someone mention WATARS or Crewettes but didn't want to ask out loud. If your Squad does not have a Crewette group, you are missing out on a lot of help. The object of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Tennessee Association of Rescue Squads is "to render any and all assistance whenever needed to T.A.R.S., to assist in the squads program of accident prevention throughout the state, and to increase the efficiency of the members through education, personal contact and participation in the State convention of Rescue Squads."

The next time you have a callout, wouldn't it be nice to know that your captain, chief, or unit director could make ONE phone call to ensure that meals would be on site for the members involved in the callout. Having a Crewette auxiliary can do that for you. One call and we are there, at the site, ready to help with food for volunteers. We can also help man the command station for a search mission or work the shore lines for dragging operations. We can be there to help provide comfort and care for any family members who may be at the callout site. Do you need someone to make sure blankets and water are ready for volunteers who may need them? Call a Crewette and it is covered.

Did you recently go on a call that required someone to help direct traffic? Wouldn't it be nice to have someone you can call just for traffic control rather than using a First Responder or EMT that would better used to help extricate the victim? Call a Crewette. She can help with traffic control. She can also go to the squad building to help answer emergency phone calls. The last time you had a road block to help raise money for new equipment, wouldn't it have been nice to have someone at more intersections? Call your Crewettes. We can help with whatever your fundraiser is, be it a road block, selling tickets for a drawing or a portrait project.

One big misconception is that Crewettes have to be related to the Squad members. While this may be true for some, it is NOT true for all. If your Squad does not already have a Crewette auxiliary, you can decide if that is something you want. Many squads have gone away from this way of thinking to allow those who want to volunteer to help but can't really go on calls or stand-bys join as Crewettes. Several groups have also incorporated the Crewettes to be a part of the Squad as Co-Op members.

The services provided by each auxiliary vary from group to group. There are so many different services provided, I could not possibly list them all. What each group does have in common is a close working relationship with the Squad it is affiliated with.

- Have the mail delivered to someone other than the treasurer. This would include the bank statement. Someone other than the Treasurer should review the bank statement and look for odd or suspicious payments;
- Donations received through the mail should be receipted and deposited by someone other than the treasurer;
- Invoices and statements should be reviewed and approved for payment by someone other than the treasurer;
- A group of members should at least annually review paid invoices, cancelled checks, bank reconciliations, and financial reports for consistency, accuracy, and adherence to policies and procedures;
- A treasurer's report should be prepared and presented to the membership on a regular basis;
- Checks for unusual payments and large sums should require two signatures. However, be careful, I once reviewed a rescue organization that required dual signatures on all checks. When I was looking through the check book I noticed a number of blank checks had already been signed by one of the authorized signatures. When I asked why the blank checks had already been signed I was told, "Well he is out of town a lot and sometimes I need to pay bills before he has time to sign them, so I go ahead and have him sign a bunch of checks in advance." This defeats the purpose of the dual signatures. Requiring two people sign the check is a safeguard that can prevent unauthorized expenditures. But only if the checks are signed after the payee is entered on the check and examination of the invoice for which payment is being made; or
- Have the treasurer and others who handle funds bonded;
- Have the financial records audited or reviewed by an independent accountant;
- Put in place policies and procedures over the way purchases are made and expenses are paid;
- Rotate the duties of treasurer, such as having a deputy or co-treasurers who rotate monthly or quarterly the duties and responsibility of their office.

These are just some suggestions that can protect and safeguard your funds. These and other policies are in place to safeguard and protect the funds of our association.

Choose and elect your treasurer wisely. Fools have said, "Anyone can write checks and pay bills." Maybe so, but the office of treasurer requires and deserves more respect. The duties and responsibilities go far beyond just writing checks and paying bills. Act responsibly, everyone shares the obligation for the proper reporting and accounting for your organization's money. Don't give anyone a license to steal. Insure proper oversight and you should not end up like a character in a bad horror movie, the victim of vicious monster called "GREED". *A ounce of prevention is worth more than a pound of cure.*

4. Click continue and you will be directed to the PayPal site for payment.
