

MORRISTOWN EMERGENCY & RESCUE SQUAD



Morristown, Tennessee is the county seat of Hamblin County (Pop. Approx. 59,000) and is situated in East Tennessee, about 40 miles NE of Knoxville. The Morristown Emergency and Rescue Squad (MERS) was officially organized in 1955 as an off shoot of the local Rod & Gun Club. Local club members had heard of the nearby squads of Greeneville and Kingsport and felt the need existed for something similar locally.

In the beginning equipment was non existent. One of the squad's Charter member recounted that when they had a meeting, if you wanted something wanted something to sit on, you brought it yourself. If you went on a mission and wanted something to eat, well, you brought that too. Like most squads drowning

recoveries and lost person searches were the original missions. An old panel van and enough equipment to conduct operations were finally acquired and the crew assisted where needed. In the early years MERS participated in missions across Tennessee and traveled to Ohio, Virginia, Maryland, North Carolina, and Kentucky to assist as well. (Talk about road trips!!).

In the late 1960's the MERS had assumed the ambulance service duties previously provided by the local funeral homes. In the beginning the calls and dispatching was handled by all volunteers. In the '70's many of MERS members were among the first to complete the EMT program. In fact one of the active members today has EMT license #092. The call

volume grew to the extent that by the early 80's the all volunteer crew found it difficult to keep up. At that point Morristown Hamblen EMS was formed with the squad remaining the parent company. Over the past 20 years that arrangement has worked well. Currently the **Ambulance Authority Board** is made up of local public safety, political, and business leaders. The MERS still has three representatives on the board. The EMS service is located at the squad's station and helps pay the utilities and insurance.

The MERS has members trained and equipped to perform Confined Space, Underwater Search & Recovery, Land Search, Swiftwater Operations, Trench, High Angle, and Vehicle Extrication Rescue.





The squad operates two fully equipped crash trucks, two suburbans, & a Jeep Cherokee as well as a one ton Ford truck with an enclosed bed to support the Water Rescue/Dive Team. A fleet of five boats rounds out the Water Rescue section. A 16 ft. enclosed trailer houses the unit's confined space and high angle equipment and also serves as a mobile command center when needed. A 6 x 6 Polaris ranger equipped with a litter, medical supplies, and winch allows the members access to rugged terrain if needed. The squad also has access to the EMS fleet of eight ambulances as well as a team of bike medics to assist with running events, mountain bike races or other public gatherings where it may be difficult to maneuver through crowds.

The squad maintains a membership level of around 70 members. This includes about 20 Explorers and Jr.

squad members, ranging in age from 14 - 20 years. While First Responder, Extrication, and EVOC are required levels of training, around 2/3's of the members are EMT-IV or Paramedics. Specialty rescue courses are also taken by most members and the squad maintains inhouse instructors for most disciplines the squad responds to.

Funding for the unit totals around \$100,000 annually. About half comes from the local United Way with the other half being raised by the squad through fundraisers and private donations. The squad receives no money from the local government and all services are provided free of charge to the community.

The squad answers on average 125 calls each month. While most are wrecks and EMS assistance calls, the squad also responds to all structure fires in the county to assist the Volunteer Fire Departments. A Thermal Imaging Camera is on board the primary crash truck which rolls on those calls. The remainder of calls include first aid standbys, water related calls, lost person and technical rescue calls. Of course on occasion the unusual call comes in. Captain Brian Robinson relates that from his earliest days in the unit a messed up call or a rescue that wasn't the norm was referred to by the older guys as a "goat roping".

Well, not to long ago a high angle rescue call required the team to rescue a wild orphan goat that was perched on a narrow ledge in a rock quarry about 75' above the water filled basin and 35' down from the top. Three hours of playing 'Rope Rescue Cowboy' snatched the goat safely from it's precarious perch and landed the squad on the front page of the paper deemed heroes and humanitarians.

MERS seems blessed with a strong membership and a great group of youth training to carry the torch into the future. Plans are currently being made in conjunction with the EMS to build two substations in the county to provide even quicker response times. Strong community support and a proactive approach by the squad to be prepared for virtually any call is a formula for success as proven . . . even if the call involves "goat roping"!■

NATIONAL TRAINING CENTER NAMED IN HONOR OF FRED O. BERRY, JR.

Federal Officials with the Homeland Secutity Department dedicated the nation's only center, to train specialists in handling fatalities involving weapons of mass destruction in Berry's name in December. Fred Berry, Jr. was an active member of TARS with the Knoxville Volunteer Rescue Squad before his death last Februry from complications following heart surgery.

Berry who was President of Berry Funeral Home in Knoxville had worked tirelessly both on the local and national levels to train and prepare teams to deal with mass fatality incidents. He was the original commander of the Region 4 DEMORT (Disaster Mortuary Response Team) which encompassed eight southeastern states. Berry's work in various aircraft crashes, the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center, and other large scale incidents had established a national repetition as one of the top people in the field. The "Fred O. Berry, Jr." Training Center is located in Rock Hill, South Carolina.
