PARIS-HENRY COUNTY RESCUE SQUAD

in Northwest Tennessee along the Kentucky and Tennessee border. Henry County (pop. 31,000+), an area of approximately 562 sq. mi., was created in 1821 from Indian lands and was named in honor of Patrick Henry (1736-1799), a Virginia statesman, patriot and Revolutionary leader. Paris, the County Seat, is well know as the Catfish Capitol of Tennessee and is also home of the PHCRS headquarters.

The unit was one of the early rescue squads to organize in Tennessee, formed by eight (8) charter members in 1955, the same year that TARS was founded. Without a doubt, the formation of the squad focused on water rescue and recovery in the early years & today remains a primary mission for the squad. With the Tennessee River and a sizeable portion of the Kentucky Lake in its area, it squads represents one of the largest bodies of water in the State and existence.

The Paris-Henry County Rescue Squad (PHCRS) is located attracts thousands of boaters, sportsmen, and barge traffic year round.

NATIONAL EMS MEMORIAL SERVICE

GLEN MOORE, CAPTAIN TARS HONOR GUARD

Each year the National EMS Memorial Service is held in Roanoke, Virginia on Memorial Day weekend. The purpose of this service is to honor emergency medical services personnel who have died in the line of duty and to recognize the ultimate sacrifice they have made for their fellow man. During the service a family member or agency representative was presented with a United States flag that had flown over the U.S. Capitol denoting the honoree's service to their country, a white rose representing their undying love, along with a medallion signifying their eternal memory.

Also as part of the service, each person being recognized is represented by their state flag. After the last name was read there was a moment of silence, followed by a last call and the playing of taps. The names of those who were honored during this ceremony will be engraved on a bronze oak leaf and added to the National EMS Memorial "Tree of Life." The oak leaf has historically been accepted as a symbol of strength, valor and solid character. All of these are common characteristics of the men and women honored.

This year's program honored 16 fallen EMS personnel from all across the United

States including one of our own from Tennessee. Joseph "Joe" Donald Snow from Clarksville, TN, a member of the Montgomery County EMS and TARS was honored. Joe

passed away on May 28, 2006 due to injuries suffered during a Water Rescue and Recovery mission at a low level dam near Clarksville. He was a devoted father and a dedicated employee who loved his work. Safety was his utmost concern. Joe was an experienced SCUBA diver and paramedic and he gave countless hours to train and oversee the service's Emergency Response Team. Ultimately, Joe gave his life doing what was dear to him.

Members of the TARS honor guard attended this memorial service on May 26, 2007 at the First Baptist Church in Roanoke, VA. Those attending were Tommy Bowers, Region II (Blount County) and Glen Moore, Region IV (Hardeman County). Both members participated in the service to honor Joe and his family. Tommy carried the Tennessee State flag, while Glen served as the escort for the family, which included Joe's two sons, his father, sister and brother.

TARS honor guards have attended and participated in this service for the past seven years. But this year's service will be especially remembered by both Tommy and Glen for many years to come because they had the honor to present "one of our own" to be included on the "Tree of Life."

A Seminar certificate with 0.3 CEUs will be awarded to attendees. Cost is only \$10 with conference Pre-registration. Seminar by itself or at the door is \$20. Classroom activity only, casual dress is acceptable.



By the mid 1960's the city had donated the lot and other local organizations including the Elks Lodge & the Paris Fire Department, had donated equipment. By then squad had expanded their building and officially joined TARS as a Unit member. The 1970's saw the unit accept the vehicle rescue mission as well as continued growth in membership, training, and equipment to conduct its expanding operations. While expansion of the existing building was accomplished the following decade to better serve the community, the decade of the 90's focused on finding the location and means to build a new facility for the organization.

That goal was realized before the new millennium in 1999 when the squad moved into a newly constructed 9600 sq. ft. facility located on a 5 acre tract donated by Henry County. Centrally located in the heart of the County on a new bypass, the squad built a fantastic facility that will serve the County well into the future. About 1/3rd of the new building is designated as administrative space for meeting rooms, kitchen, day-room, communications area, office space for squad officials and bunk areas. The balance of space consists of five (5) large bays around 80 ft. deep that provides ample storage to house the squad's equipment.

It seems the new decade is quickly taking shape with the goal of updating rolling stock and other unit equipment. New Rescue One boats, a Ford quad cab truck, and newly acquired F-550 Extrication unit, trailered four wheelers, and Mobile Command Post have replaced and supplemented the squads tools of trade.

With 39 active members, a third are EMT to Paramedic level, about a fifth are firefighters, and membership also includes dispatchers, deputies and a coroner, as well as 2 divers. That diversity blesses the squad with a healthy mix of well trained emergency volunteers dedicated to serve their community in a professional manner.

Over 50 years of success and hard work has proven a good foundation that promises a bright future for the PHCRS. A motto depicted below the Association emblem, that was moved from the old original building, hangs prominently on a wall in the new headquarters says..."The Desire to Serve, The Ability to Perform, & The Courage to Act".

As long as we all embrace that philosophy and work together, our future can be bright and promising in service to our fellow man.
