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SPOTLIGHT ON...By Steve Carden

CLEVELAND-BRADLEY COUNTY RESCUE SERVICES

Bradley County (pop. approx. 88,000) is located in Southeast Tennessee and home to the Cleveland-Bradley County Rescue Services (CBCRS) Organized in 1962, the unit's primary function then was Water Search and Recovery Operations. While Water Rescue is still an important function of the unit, it is only one part of a multi-disciplined emergency service some 42 years later.



Today the Water Rescue Team is trained and equipped to deal with Swiftwater/Flood Rescue, Dive Rescue as well as boat based operations utilizing "Rescue One" connector boats and jet skis. Other specialized teams include Hazardous Materials, Trench/Structural Collapse, High Angle, and Confined Space Rescue. All these areas of course, are in addition to the Vehicle Extrication role the unit provides.

With 45 active members the squad answers in excess of 500 calls annually. All members are required to maintain vehicle extrication certification and a host of awareness level training at a minimum. An additional 25 reserve members are on the role for activation if needed. If members are part of a specialty team, they are required to achieve technician level training for that particular rescue discipline.

In addition to maintaining training levels, all active members must serve 16 hours per month duty time. Twelve hours may be



stand-by or manning a shift truck, with the remaining four hours dedicated to maintenance or administrative duties.

The CBCRS is a quasi-governmental volunteer organization which operates under the local Emergency Management Agency. This marriage has proved extremely successful in the management and continuity of the unit's mission responsibility to local government.

TARS HONOR GUARD SERVES AT 2004 NATIONAL EMS MEMORIAL SERVICE

Each year the National EMS Memorial Service is held in Roanoke, Virginia on Memorial Day weekend. The purpose of the service is to honor emergency medical services personnel who have died in the line of duty and to recognize the ultimate sacrifice they have made for their fellow man. During the service a family member or agency representative was presented with a United States Flag that had flown over the U.S. Capitol denoting the honoree's service to their Country, a white rose representing their undying love, along with a medallion signifying their eternal memory. Also as a part of the service, each person being recognized is represented by their State Flag. After the last name was read there was a moment of silence, followed by a last call and the playing of taps along with a fly over by Lifeguard 10.

This year's program honored 14 fallen EMS personnel from all across the United States including Hawaii. this year's program also inducted the youngest member at 18 years old and the oldest member who was 83.

Honor Guards from TARS have attended



and participated in this program for the past four years. This year's attendees were Glen Moore (Region IV), Thomas Bragg and Tommy Bowers (Region II). Also, attending from TARS were Parliamentarian Joe Arnold and Chaplain Roy Goddard.

2004 CONVENTION IN KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE

The 49th ANNUAL TARS CONVENTION will be held October 7, 8, & 9, 2004 at the Marriott Hotel (formerly the Hyatt Regency) in Knoxville, Tennessee. Your Convention Pre-Registration form and Hotel reservation information are included in this newsletter. Please take care of these items early to help avoid delays or possible sell-outs.

The Marriott Hotel is conveniently located in downtown Knoxville and is surrounded by local attractions and restaurants. All of our functions will be held on site, so your attendance at the meetings, exhibits, and contests will be only a few moments walk from each other.

CONTESTS

Some contests scheduled are the Vehicle Extrication contests, the Rescue Challenge, the Emergency Care Contest, the (EVOC) Emergency Driving Contest, and The Rambling Rescue Race. Don't forget the Horseshoe and the Turn-Out Gear Competitions. Rules and entry forms have been sent to your squad, so get with some fellow members and enter.

It's guaranteed to be fun!!!

TRAINING

This year's Convention will offer a multi track educational opportunity on Thursday. Be sure and mark your registration form indicating your selection from the following seminars.

Track 1A: Weapons of Mass Destruction Awareness Level - 11 am-3 pm. This four hour course focuses on the hazards and indications of Chemical and Biological agents and nuclear materials. Instruction includes appropriate response actions to NBC - nuclear, biological, and chemical incidents, and the identification of such dissemination devices used in terrorist incidents. (Seminar will also include a TEMA certificate.)

Track 1B:Aviation Rescue - 1 pm - 3 pm This two hour program will introduce the rescuer to the availability and capabilities of the U. S. Army "UH-60 Blackhawk" helicopter in civilian operations. A tour of the aircraft, some LZ pointers and a demonstration will be included.

Track 2A: Meth Lab Awareness, 3-5 pm This two hour program focuses on the indicators and hazards of illegal meth labs. First Responders are increasingly at risk of being exposed and need at least this level of training to better recognize potential threats in the field and what to do about them.

Track 2B: Sudden Infant Death Syndrome Training: 3 pm to 5 pm. The State of Tennessee passed the Sudden Unexplained Child Death Act in 2001 and amended this act in April of 2002. The Act mandates that all

EMTs, EMT-Ps and professional firefighters receive training on handling cases of sudden unexplained infant death as part of their basic and continuing training requirements. This two hour session meets this requirement which aims to reduce the incidence of injury and death to infants by accurately identifying the cause and manner of death of infants of less than one year.

Track 3: Weapons of Mass Destruction Operators Level, 6 pm - 10 pm. This four hour course is for First Responders who have already received the awareness level training (See Track 1A). The program outlines emergency decontamination procedures in a WMD event. It stresses the importance of personal protective equipment (PPE). It also covers site management of a NBC incident and construction of a downwind hazard analysis and factors that would affect a toxic plume. (Seminar will include a TEMA certificate).

Please indicate your plans to attend on the registration form and include the proper fee with your payment. The seminar will include a certificate awarding C.E.U.s for those attending.

ENTERTAINMENT

This year's Thursday evening outing is a two hour Dinner Cruise on-board the 'Star of Knoxville' Riverboat. The Luau Cruise is a sure winner with onboard entertainment and a great dinner buffet featuring an all you care to eat Seafood Buffet with Tossed Garden Salad, Calypso Fruit Salad, Shrimp and selected (in season) seafoods, Pineapple Chicken and Caribbean Blend Mixed Vegetables, Fresh Baked Rolls, Coffee, Tea, Soft-Drinks (all you can drink) and Dessert. Spotlight on...Cleveland-Bradley County

As a result, funding the general operating budget of \$120-130,000 is provided on a 80%/20% basis by the county and city governments respectively. Additional funds for capital improvements may come in the form of grants, direct appropriations and local fundraising efforts the squad may conduct. One interesting project the squad has promoted in the community is a "Cans for Life" program. Aluminum cans are collected from the general public at six large collection points across the county. The squad owns a crusher and periodically empties and prepares the aluminum for recycling. While requiring some time and effort, the unit can typically see \$12,000 - \$15,000 per year gained, not to mention helping the environment.

What's on the horizon? Well . . . the unit is heavily involved in the development of a regional Haz-Mat team. The team is to be a multi- agency response team involving rescue, fire, and law enforcement agencies in the region. These cooperative efforts and funding for such are driven by Homeland Security initiatives and funding. The squad expects to play an integral part of the team and appears to be in line for a new Haz-Mat unit and equipment valued in excess of a quarter of a million dollars. Added to that are hopes of another new shift truck similar to the F450 Series medium rescue truck added last year.

The squad operates out of their headquarters (formerly an automobile dealership building) in downtown Cleveland. The location is geographically about dead center in the County and this provides a neat home for a



neat organization. Hey,as a fellow rescue member if you are ever in the area you should stop by for a visit. I guarantee you will leave impressed and inspired with some ideas to take back home.

By the way . . . bring some cold sodas to share if you visit . . (er . . cans only please, no bottles)!■
